4-H SAFETY

BASIC FIRST AID

4-H projects and activities are planned and organized with the forethought to prevent potential injuries or illnesses. However, unforeseen accidents or exposures at 4-H projects or activities periodically occur that result in either injuries or illnesses. When an inadvertent injury or illness occurs, it is necessary to have basic first aid awareness to assist the accident or exposure victim.

BASIC FIRST AID AWARENESS:

- Always carry or know where a first aid kit is located at 4-H activities or projects.
- Know the directions to the closest emergency care facility.
- Assure that a land-line or cell phone is available at 4-H activities or projects.
- Before assisting an accident victim, it is important to assess the accident scene to assure that it is safe to provide first aid.
 - Have a bystander immediately call 911.

4-H POLICIES

PETTING ZOO POLICY

The following policies must be followed when a 4-H group wishes to host a petting zoo:

- 818.1 Petting zoos must only feature small (i.e., animals weighing 100 pounds or less), miniature, or young animals. Fully grown cows, horses, hogs or other large animals pose a greater risk of injury to petting zoo visitors and may not be featured in 4-H sponsored petting zoos.
- **818.2** Petting zoo animals shall be screened to eliminate those that exhibit aggressiveness, signs of illness, or other types of poor behavior.
- **818.3** Newborn animals are not appropriate for petting zoos and shall not be featured.
- 818.4 Petting zoo pen and enclosure areas shall be effectively managed and supervised to provide environments that are safe and healthy for both visitors and animals and their interactions.
- 818.5 In addition to any state or local regulations or fair policies, groups operating petting zoos shall follow the recommendations of the most current version of the Compendium of Measures to Prevent Disease Associated with Animals in Public Settings, published by the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians. www.nasphv.org/Documents/AnimalsInPublic-Settings.pdf
- 818.6 ANR Environmental Health & Safety will provide additional guidance documents, forms, and signs and can assist a group in planning a safe petting zoo event. See the ANR EH&S website http://safety.ucanr.org for petting zoo resources.
